

On Saturday 30 May a group of 14 cyclists left Mountmellick to head for the Mater Hospital in Dublin and to raise money for the Irish Heart Foundation, the Irish Lung Fibrosis Association and the Heart and Lung Unit in the Mater Hospital. It was a beautiful sunny day and all fourteen cyclists completed the route via Kildare town, Newbridge, and Naas. We had twelve helpers along the route organising bucket collections. Around four hours later all cyclists arrived safely outside the Mater Hospital in Dublin.

Tom Flynn, the chief organiser of the cycle, underwent a lung transplant operation in the Mater Hospital in 2005. Tom had lung fibrosis and this was his way of saying thanks to the charities and staff of the Mater Hospital.

Joe Cosgrave, one of the helpers, had a double heart by-pass in 2008. Helping to raise funds for the Irish Heart Foundation was his way of saying thanks.

A special thanks to Professor Jim Egan who came down from Dublin to cycle with us; it was a great morale boost for the group to have him cycling alongside us.

Thanks also to all the helpers and cyclists who took part on the day. Also we would like to thank the charity groups who provided t-shirts, balloons, and collection buckets for the event, so to Nicola Cassidy of the ILFA, and to Tanya Comber of the Irish Heart Foundation a big thank you as well.

WICKLOW 200km CYCLING CHALLENGE

A group of 30 cyclists led by Professor Jim Egan took on the Wicklow 200km Cycling Challenge again this year to raise funds for ILFA.

Professor Egan said: "It was a tough day with the first of the team members arriving back in Belfield after eight hours and the last ones in just under eleven hours. The cold north-easterly wind which we had to face on the homeward leg from Rathdrum made it even tougher than usual."

The cyclists had completed three significant climbs before they got as far as Rathdrum – the Sally Gap, Slieve Meann and the Shay Elliott.
